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## **Governor Sets New Ambitious Climate Goals**

Study pinpoints economic impacts of cutting emissions 40% below 1990 levels by 2030, one million additional jobs & six percent higher GSP

SAN FRANCISCO—Today Governor Jerry Brown issued an executive order calling for a 40 percent reduction in the state's greenhouse gas emissions when compared to 1990 levels by the year 2030. <u>California Climate Policy to 2050: Pathways for Sustained</u> <u>Prosperity</u>, authored by Professor David Roland-Holst at the University of California, Berkeley and presented by the nonprofit, nonpartisan group Next 10 (<u>www.Next10.org</u>) assesses the employment, income, price, and emission impacts of Brown's new order, and other pathways.

The governor's executive order aligns with the study's "progressive scenario," which means potential economic benefits include the addition of one million jobs and six percent higher GSP.
